52 scenes about a relationship are titled, and each title is written on an ordinary deck of playing cards. At the top of the show, the cards are thrown up in the air and land on the stage, and the performance follows the order that they are arbitrarily picked up throughout the show.

An astutely intimate rollercoaster, **52 PICK UP** works like memory - not linear, but swerving from belly-busting comedy, to hysterically universal truths to quiet heartbreak in the literal drop of a card.

WHAT'S THE SPECIAL INTERESTING DEAL ABOUT 52 PICK UP?

The technical format of 52 PICK UP is very unique - at the top of the show, one of the performers throws a deck of cards in the air. Each card has the title of a scene written on it, and the shape of the show is then determined by random chance as the cards are picked up throughout the show.

***A WORD ABOUT THE ODDS OF TWO SHOWS OF 52 PICK UP EVER BEING THE SAME:**

Never.

Oh - all right... - a mathematical engineer fan of ours in Seattle did the math -

One in 80 658 175 170 943 878 571 660 636 856 403 766 975 289 505 440 883 277 824 000 00 000 000.
(YIKES!!!)

52! (read "52 factorial")

Although this number is outrageously big, it is real. The formula for finding the maximum number of variations in a deck of 52 cards is $52 \times 51 \times 50 \times 49 \times 48 \times 47 \dots$ all the way down to $\times 3 \times 2 \times 1$. Try it with paper and pencil. It'll be fun.

As a point of interest, the odds of getting all 6 numbers right and thereby winning Lotto 6/49 are 1 in 10 068 347 520.

Hmmm. The odds of winning a Lotto 6/49 are waaaaay better...
